Louisville, KY – (August 8, 2024) – American Printing House for the Blind (APH) recently welcomed Congressman Morgan McGarvey and Assistant Secretary of Labor for Disability Employment Policy, Taryn M. Williams, for a factory floor tour, Monarch demonstration, and a behind-the-scenes look at APH products and services that help create equity and access in the classroom and workplace for students and adults who are blind or low vision.

"Accessibility in the classroom unlocks the child's full potential to conquer the world," said Craig Meador, Ed. D., APH President. "An accessible workplace is not only an issue of equity but is key for employees to fully utilize their skills and talents for the benefit of everyone."

During their time at APH, Congressman McGarvey and Secretary Williams engaged with enthusiastic employees and staff about the importance of creating products for students in grades K-12 who are blind or low vision, as well as learning about various APH services that equip older individuals who are also blind or low vision with the necessary skills to secure employment and thrive in the workplace.

Unemployment rates for individuals who are blind or low vision are extremely high. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 44 percent of people who are blind or low vision are employed, compared to 79 percent of people without disabilities. Aside from access in the workplace being a barrier, lack of education and understanding from the employer is another obstacle job seekers who are blind or low vision face. Many employers do not understand how simple accommodations such as light boxes, magnifiers, or refreshable braille displays, can assist an individual who is blind or low vision to do a job successfully.
