He went on to complete his residency in ophthalmology at UofL and a fellowship in glaucoma and anterior segment surgery at Indiana University in Indianapolis, IN. Dr Gambrell joined the Robley Rex VA Medical Center in 2015. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Ophthalmology, member of the American Glaucoma Society, and passionate about empowering individuals affected by visual impairment.

Dr. Gambrell brings a unique personal perspective to the Board, as he has seen first-hand how APH's products and services impact students. His daughter is legally blind and used APH products throughout her education.

Prior to joining Johns Hopkins School of Medicine, Dr. Goldstein provided low vision care to patients in her private clinical practice and served as Vice President of Clinical Services of Pioneer EyeCare as well as Director of Low Vision Services at the University of Maryland.
